Everyone loves browsing through the family photo album or seeing the readymade album Facebook creates using highlights and special days we've posted



throughout the year. "Ah, what memories!" we say as one image fades into another. Grandmas and grandpas; aunts and uncles; children and pets; holidays and other festive times; even just ordinary, day-to-day happenings around the house. Why reminisce? We enjoy a good trip down memory lane! Perhaps because it anchors us to our past, reminds us who we are, where we have been, shows us we belong.

This is also why we celebrate All Saints' Day – technically on November 1, but we'll celebrate it November 4th & 5th. All Saints' Day is the big day when the Church stops to look at her own Facebook page/Family Album. How comforting to look at past saints and see how God dealt with them in his mercy and forgiveness. How comforting to have the family history of God's people. It reminds us who we are as God's people. It reminds us that we are not alone on this journey of faith.

Even though Lutherans claim Luther's "Simul Justus et Peccator" (which literally means we are "at once justified and a sinner"), we don't quite accept that we could really be saints. One of my favorite children's sermon on All Saint's Sunday ended with the response of one child to my question, "What is a saint?" The child, looking angelically at the stained glass windows, pointed and simply said, "It's someone the light shines through." Absolutely right!

So, what makes a saint? The answer is simple: God's blessing! We have just celebrated Reformation Sunday, the day we intentionally remember and give thanks that we are justified by grace through faith in Jesus Christ. We remember that we cannot earn our way into God's grace – but rather, that God's grace is poured out abundantly on all sinners day after day. We remind ourselves that we neither deserve nor merit such blessing, yet God's love, given unconditionally, declares us precious and holy! If that were the end of God's generosity, we'd be incredibly blessed! Yet there is more! God's blessing continues with the giving of the Holy Spirit poured out on all flesh so that the light of Christ shines through ordinary human beings like you and me!

But what does all this mean, given we are simultaneously sinners? Can we really consider ourselves saints? Let's open the Church's photo album.

When we recall the names of saints that appear in the Bible, famous individuals who risked everything to serve the One True God or who gave their life to follow Jesus, we can't imagine that we could aspire to be saints. Not us! Not me! I fear we conveniently experience selective amnesia, you know, forgetting all the parts where the heroes of the Bible seriously sinned or disappointed God, too. We forget that they were also self-centered (King David taking Bathsheba for his own pleasure though she was married to Uriah), feared losing their lives (Abraham passing off Sarah as his sister because he was afraid of being killed), wondered if God would ever keep the promises made to them (Moses leading the Israelites through the wilderness for forty years), well, you get my point.

In the New Testament, God still called and claimed ordinary people, using them to reveal his great love for all humankind. The disciples who stumbled at every turn, argued about who is the greatest, demanded places of highest honor in Jesus' Kingdom, and forever

failed to grasp the expansive grace of God for all people – still managed to be people through whom the light of Christ shines, sharing the story of God's amazing grace. It is not about us, brothers and sisters, or whether we are good enough. It IS about Christ through whom all things are made possible! Thanks be to God!

Within the Church, November is a month of remembrance, reflection, and celebration as we bring the Church-year to a close on Christ the King Sunday (November 26th) and anticipate a new year with the Advent of our Lord (December 3rd). It is also a time to give thanks for the cloud of witnesses who have handed on faith that we might come to believe that Jesus is the Son of God. But believing alone is not enough, even Satan believes in God. Imperfect as we are, we are the modern-day saints through whom Christ continues to share his unconditional love and pour out his abundant blessings for all. Rise up, you saints of God, "Let your so shine before others that they may see your good works and glorify our Father in heaven!

The Truth of What We Bring

On Sunday morning (or Wednesday or Saturday evenings), a person places a check, folded bills into the offering plate, or contributes through Simply Giving. The usher sees the hand drop some money into the plate, but what that usher cannot see is the intention of the Offering. That is known only to the giver and God. Yet the action is one of the most powerful events of the Worship service.

The Offering is the point during every Worship liturgy when most people face the intersection between God's grace and human gratitude.

Are we willing to freely give, even if it means giving up money, which in our culture signifies power? Be it a tithe, a couple of one-dollar bills, or nothing at all, our Offering is an outward sign of our inner spiritual intentions, and a unique time of truth in Worship. The truth of what we bring reveals itself in answer to such questions as these:

- Do I give or not? Can I let go of what I consider to be mine?
- Why do I give? Do I give out of fear, or duty, or to contribute to the work of building up the Kingdom of God?
- And, how much do I give?

The answers to those questions produce an x-ray of one's spiritual life. To most people the Offering is about fundraising. The church's bills must be paid, so there is always tension about money. Unfortunately, church leaders are often left with a burden of anxiousness on behalf of their sisters and brothers that is unjust. Wanting to be faithful stewards, they stress


over how things will be paid while other ministry leaders wrangle with whether there will be financial support to encourage or expand existing discipleship opportunities. Truth be told, the Offering should be a profound spiritual exercise. If those things we possess are all gifts from God's abundance, then giving back to God is an act of gratitude.

Belonging to a church, a community of Christ followers, means we are giving consent to all that God is calling us to do, supporting the work of those on the front lines, while simultaneously, providing for the less glamourous expenses like electric bills, heating/cooling, water, and the day-to-day operating costs.

I believe in Straight Talk that informs, equips, and moves us to action. The COVID dollars which floated the church through the most difficult years of the pandemic, are exhausted. We, your Leadership Team, find ourselves worrying about shortfalls rather than focusing on where the Holy Spirit is leading. We need you! Every Offering, great or small, is deeply appreciated and I thank you in advance.

Prayerfully consider, and listening to the intention of your gift, help us to continue proclaiming the Gospel and equipping the saints of all ages! You, sharing the gifts God has given you, is the answer to heartfelt prayers.

- 5. Call someone and see how they are doing
- 6. Send an encouraging card to someone
- 7. Babysit or watch someone's house
- 8. Give someone a ride to an appointment
- 9. Share your faith
- 10. Read a book of faith
- 11. Volunteer with some organization
- 12. Read a daily devotional
- 13. Share a meal with a neighbor
- 14. Help someone with their homework-tutor
- 15. Pack a school lunch or a week of lunches for a neighborhood child or children
- 16. Donate supplies to a local school or non-profit (i.e. office supplies or class supplies such as paper towels, wipes etc.)
- 17. Use your talents for friends of local organization (i.e. manage a social media account of an organization)

- 18. Teach your passion/hobby to others
- 19. Serve a non-profit organization
- 20. Become a mentor
- 21. Volunteer to read or do an activity at a nursing home or assisted living facilities
- 22. Make care packages for individuals or an organization
- 23. Volunteer coach
- 24. Welcome newcomers
- 25. Intentionally looks for new faces in church or people you usually don't have coffee with.
- 26. Write encouraging notes to nursing homes, hospitals, local heroes
- 27. Take part in a seasonal service project (i.e. bell ringer)
- 28. Donate personal or hygiene items to a local facility or organization
- 29. Collect and donate items for an animal shelter
- 30. Volunteer at a local school
- 31. Cook for an individual, family or organization
- 32. Lead a small group study group
- 33. Anything else you can think of! Be creative!


